Creating a Garden for Birds



This information came from brochure sponsored by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology .

First step: does your yard provide the basics for a bird; food, water, shelter?

If there is a shortage of food you can hang up bird feeders but also consider planting some fruit-bearing trees or shrubs. Plants that hold their berries through winter form a vital winter food source.

Water-Even just a common bird bath will do. Some people hang a a plastic bottle or jug with a hole of water in the bottom over the bird bath. The motion and sound of the dripping water is irresistible to birds.

Does your yard have an area of dense growth that birds can use for nesting. If not, shrubs , vine sor trees will do the trick. Try to create lush, wild growth in a few places to simulate a natural environment. Nest boxes will also help cavity nesting birds.
